





DO YOU KNOW WHO TIM BERNERS-LEE IS?

During the years of 1989 to 1991, Tim Berners-Lee was one of the leading innovators of new technology that led to the development of the World Wide Web, or the Internet. A 1976 graduate in Physics from Oxford University, he is currently the director of the World Wide Web Consortium, the group that sets technical standards for the Web. And what an incredible creation the internet is! It allows instant communication virtually anywhere in the world, provides entertainment beyond our dreams, and furnishes information distribution never before thought possible.

Recently, I was able to sit down at my computer and look up the house that my family lived in prior to our move to North Carolina. My dad, a sales director for Scott Paper Company, one day in 1953 informed the family that a job transfer was going to move us to the Charlotte area. I've enjoyed living in North Carolina for over sixty years, but I wanted to see what my old neighborhood looks like today. Thanks to Google Maps, I was able to locate it exactly, and a street view revealed the one-story brick house that now occupies the lot where our old two-story frame house once stood.

When we lived there, it was a quiet neighborhood, with tree-lined streets, a nearby stream where we could catch crawfish, and a street light where we played kick-the-can until well after dark on warm summer nights. I remember walking home from school in the second and third grades, a walk of about thirty minutes. There was a bakery along the way at which my friends and I could buy a loaf of French bread for ten cents when we were lucky enough to have any money in our pockets. The decade of the fifties was a peaceful one, filled with warm memories for those of us who were around back then.

Something has happened to that neighborhood. It's recently been overcome by thugs, many of whom don't even live in the same state. My old address, 44 Lee Avenue in Ferguson, Missouri is just one block from an area torn apart by people who used a grand jury decision

as an excuse to riot, to burn buildings, to destroy businesses, and to ravage lives. Peaceful protest and non-violent resistance, as advocated by those such as Mohandas Gandhi, Martin Luther King, Lech Walesa, and others, have their place and have accomplished a great deal of good in so many places around the globe. Rioting and destruction such as that seen in Ferguson does great harm, and only serves to divide a community and nation further.



Our Scottish Rite principles teach that we should stand up for that which is right and that we should not countenance actions that are born of hatred, expediency, greed, or any other unworthy, dishonorable, or despicable motivations. It is time for our society to put an end to behavior such as that seen in Ferguson and promote more appropriate means to address grievances. Injustices will always exist – such is the nature of human behavior. By reaching out to greater numbers and promoting the time-tested principles of our forefathers, Freemasonry and the Scottish Rite can make a difference. Perhaps the new year will give us further opportunities to do so.

This program identifies the danger of allowing outdated and un-needed prescription medication to accumulate in areas where children and addicts can gain access. He organized a turn-in program within his department

and has already collected over one million dosage units. These are pills that will not find their way into little hands or criminals pockets.

Asa is a member of Franklin Lodge No. 109. He has been active in the Scottish Rite for quite some time and is Master of the Fourth Apartment of the Thirtieth Degree. The wheel chair was re-upholstered by Knights of the KSA and delivered to the deserving brother. All this was made possible by the fact that one member saw a need and decided to take action. 
THE VALLEY OF RALEIGH
