As we progress towards the end of the year, we tend to look back on some things that might leave us with regret – but we can also look forward to what might transpire in the New Year ahead. A brief recap of 2015 will reveal some items of interest:


Several of our Valleys began to deal with changes in their physical facilities. Charlotte and Raleigh found their buildings to be under contract to be sold. As of this writing, they’re both still awaiting decisions of the zoning commissions in their respective cities. Winston-Salem has found their new building nearing completion. New Bern moved out of its building in June and now meets in the local York Rite building. And Wilmington has entered into a fund-raising campaign in an effort to maintain theirs rather than selling it.

The Valley of Asheville, which moved away from its temple association several years ago, has experienced a decline in participation since the departure and is now taking steps to relocate back into the temple building. The Valley of Greensboro, which only a short time ago was in the midst of controversy concerning possible sale of its building, is finding renewed energy and enthusiasm surrounding ongoing efforts to update the interior of its building.

The membership decline that has been going on for several decades is now beginning to show signs of abatement. Analysis of trends in blue lodge as well as Scottish Rite bodies provides expectations that membership stability will be achieved within about two to five years. Unfortunately, the continuing decline has eroded the income base of our Valleys, necessitating increases in dues in order to avoid curtailment of services to members and reduction in Valley activities. Our members should be pleased with how carefully Valley

leadership has reduced expenditures in order to minimize these dues increases.

The good news is that morale remains high is improving every day. The new Valley of Franklin is making progress towards becoming fully operational as a Valley in the hopes of obtaining its charter. The Valley of Enfield, which had become somewhat moribund, has found new life and is meeting regularly and holding reunions. Virtually all of our Valleys are in high expectations that VMAP will provide very positive results, in terms of both membership levels and member satisfaction with their Scottish Rite experience. Valleys that are in the process of relocating to more affordable facilities are viewing the move as a step forward rather than as one backward. In short, while our Valleys are facing a number of challenges, they are doing so with a positive outlook. Expectations are that the future of the Scottish Rite in North Carolina is bright. Certainly, the Rite will look somewhat different than it has in the past, but it will remain one of the appendant orders of choice for Masons in our Orient – and rather than lamenting “*what might have been,*” our members will be able to rejoice in what our beloved organization has become.

DUES INFORMATION

The Valley of New Bern Membership Retention Team (MRT), headed by Tom Mann 32° KCCH, is working to notify Brothers who are in arrears on their annual dues. Many of the Brothers are unfamiliar with the annual dues notification and due date so we hope this article will help answer any of your questions.

The Supreme Council sends dues notices around September stating that the dues are due before January 1, of the next year. This gives the Brothers ample notice (approximately three months) to pay their dues. If a Brother does not pay his dues prior to January 1, they are in arrears and **CAN NOT** attend any Scottish Rite functions, including Reunions, until their dues are paid. One of the issues the MRT is finding is that some Brothers have their bills paid through a financial institution or family member. Brothers, please notify your bank, credit union or family

member to pay this bill prior to January 1.

If you are in arrears, the Valley of New Bern sends out late notices around March and June. During this time members of the Brother to Brother Program are contacting the membership either personally or by telephone concerning their continuing participation in the Scottish Rite. Prior to the December Lodge of Perfection meeting those Brothers who are in arrears are again contacted before being excluded for non-payment of dues (NPD).

Brothers, the Valley of New Bern was there for you when you petitioned to become a Scottish Rite Mason. Please support the Valley of New Bern with your annual dues so we can be there for you and the next Masons petitioning to become Scottish Rite members seeking to receive more light in Masonry.

A "ROYAL GIFT" INDEED

A member of our Valley has recently acquired a scarce complete original four-volume set of Ill. Brother Albert Pike's **Music for the Ritual of the Various Degrees in the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, According to the Working of the Mother Supreme-Council of the World (S.J.U.S.A.), Selected, Arranged And Composed by Matthew Cooke, XXX°**. First published in 1881, by the J.J. Little & Co., of New York, for the Supreme Council, S.J., the volumes are the product of the dedication of one Scottish Rite Mason, and the grand vision of another. At the time of composition, Bro. Cooke was the Honorary Grand Organist for the Supreme Council, S.J., and Albert Pike was Grand Commander. By the year 1871, which witnessed the publication of **Morals and Dogma**, containing the thirty-two lectures for the degrees, it would seem that Pike's revisions to the degrees were in all respects complete; but for Pike, something was still needed. From the beginning he had envisioned degrees that engaged all the faculties of the candidate, degrees that were sure to be both intellectually and aesthetically fulfilling. Pike who, along with his numerous other accomplishments, was a violinist, recognized the power that music, when appropriately selected and arranged, could bring to the Scottish Rite experience; thus, he turned to Bro. Matthew Cooke, a British composer and a recognized Masonic scholar in his own right. Pike entrusted him with the formidable task of arranging music for all the degrees, and additional ceremonies of the Rite. Bro. Cooke saw it as a unique opportunity to make a personal contribution. Cooke, humbly, writes in the Dedication: *"In this, our common labor of love for the most ennobling Rite in Free-Masonry. I claim only to be an illustrator, bringing to bear a somewhat special knowledge of, both, Music and Free-Masonry to assist in rendering your various Rituals more*

impressive and ornate." In total, the **Music for the Ritual**, which took three years to complete, encompasses three hundred and fifty-nine pieces of music, spread over seven hundred pages, and contained in four sumptuously bound folio-size volumes. When he had completed his masterpiece, Bro. Cooke graciously presented it to the Scottish Rite gratis, repeatedly refusing any form of remuneration for his extensive effort. Albert Pike's satisfaction with the finished product is attested to by the following statement he makes in the preface: *"He [Cooke],"* Pike writes, *"has thus done what no other living Bro.: could have done for the Ancient and accepted Scottish Rite."* Pike's words also reveal that he actively oversaw the entire project to completion, as he states that Bro. Cooke revised a *"considerable portion"* at his *"special request."* In the Allocation of 1878, Pike forewarns the Supreme Council that the cost of publication of the **Music for the Ritual** will be expensive, but that, *"it must be published..."* The books themselves, which are an exemplification of the craft of bookbinding, evidence that no expense was spared in translating Pike's vision.

As time draws near for our fall Reunion, I think it appropriate to share the story of these books, which can serve as a reminder to each of us involved in the exemplification and communication of the degrees that we all have an individual gift, talent, skill, knowledge, or vision to contribute, and that we should continually strive to make the experience as intellectually and aesthetically rewarding as possible for the candidate. We can all approach Scottish Rite Masonry in the same manner as Cooke and Pike, which is, by viewing it as a unique opportunity to make a personal and lasting contribution to the most "ennobling Rite in Free-Masonry."

The Valley of New Bern, like the other Valleys in the Orient of North Carolina, has accepted the challenge of having a Valley Membership Achievement Program (VMAP) and is actively organizing to select, implement, accomplish and document the VMAP tasks and organizations proposed in the VMAP Workbook. It started with our Personal Representative, Billy Dill 33°, and the Strategic Planning Committee selecting Fred Whitty 32° KCCH, as the VMAP Coordinator. Many of these tasks were associated with Brothers already working the same or similar tasks and/or chairing many of the organizations already established. If the goal of \$1,000,000 in donations and pledges is reached by December 31, 2015, all pledges will become due by January 10, 2016.





* They trembled and shook when I buried my parents and spouse and walked my daughter down the aisle.

* They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed and cleansed the rest of my body.

* They have been sticky and wet, bent and broken, dried and raw.

* And to this day, when not much of anything else of me works real well, these hands hold me up, lay me down, and again continue to fold in prayer.

* These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of my life.

* But more importantly it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when he leads me home.

* And with my hands He will lift me to His side and there I will use these hands to touch His face."

I will never look at my hands the same again. But I remember God reached out and took my grandpa's hands and led him home.

When my hands are hurt or sore I think of Grandpa. I know he has been stroked and caressed and held by the hands of God. I, too, want to touch the face of God and feel His hands upon my face.

It also elects certain Masters of the Royal Secret to receive the Rank and Decoration of Knights Commander of the Court of Honour. This year, the Orient of North Carolina was privileged to have twenty-six members elected to receive the Thirty-third Degree and forty-seven to receive the KCCH.

Being designated to receive one of these Honors is something special to every recipient, and represents a signal event in the life of a Scottish Rite Mason. To many, both within as well as without the fraternity, it represents recognition for a great deal of service – to the fraternity, to the surrounding community, and to society in general. In fact, it is much more. More than anything else, it is recognition of the character of the involved individual. Indeed,
